

## SELECTED BIBLIOGRAPHY ON SOCIAL SCIENCE AND HEALTH IN CANADA

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A preliminary draft of this bibliography was prepared as a working document for the Workshop on Social Science and Health in Canada held in June, 1969. All of the relevant Canadian journals were reviewed that were felt to be an outlet for articles in this field, as were certain key journals published in other countries. The original draft of the bibliography has been considerably augmented by the numerous references suggested by the participants at the Workshop. In addition, the compilation has drawn upon four separate Medlars bibliographic searches, three of which had been requested for other purposes (Behavioural Science and Health in the United States; Social Sciences and Health in Canada; Organization and Delivery of Health Services in Canada; and Studies of Medical Practice). Numerous unpublished yet relevant studies were collated from the National Library of Canada's annual listing of Canadian Theses from 1962 to 1968, and the roster of M.Sc. theses completed at the University of Toronto's School of Hygiene. Other sources of information included the Annotated Bibliography on Vital and Health Statistics published by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the annual listing of Research Projects and Investigations into

Socio-Economic Aspects of Health and Research Projects and Investigations Related to Hospitals issued by Research and Statistics Directorate of the Canadian Department of National Health and Welfare, Current Bibliography of Epidemiology published by the American Public Health Association and the Index to Medical Socioeconomic Literature of the American Medical Association.

We recognize that this bibliography is incomplete and constitutes only an "at best" approximation of the state of the field in Canada. Many items listed do not fall directly into the category of sociologic inquiry, but represent topics and issues that are a necessary foundation for more analytic studies in the future and are included to serve that end.

Although it was our original intent to annotate the references listed here, this proved to be too ambitious an undertaking at this time. The references have been listed according to a modified classification initially developed by Eliot Freidson in his analysis of the Sociology of Medicine published in *Current Sociology*, 10-11, 123-191, 1961-1962.

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
