During Norman's 15-year tenure at the Quarterly, he corresponded with thousands of authors and reviewers. We do not have the words to thank Norman adequately for his dedicated tenure at the *Quarterly*. Nevertheless, I and David Willis and Ronald Bayer, the previous *Quarterly* editors who also had the privilege of working with Norman, express our appreciation to, and fondness for, an outstanding colleague. We wish him a retirement full of crossword puzzles, Cole Porter lyrics, and interesting excursions, some of his many delightful avocations.
